
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
Wokingham Flu Plan 2014 / 2015

Background and 2013/2014 Data


Winter 2013/2014 was relatively mild with low levels of circulating flu but in 2012/2013 11,000 deaths nationally were attributable to flu. Flu outbreaks put excess pressure on A&E and increases unplanned hospital admissions along with pressure on primary care appointments. Graph 1 shows the percentage of excess deaths by condition grouped from 2004 – 2011. The greatest percentage is owing to influenza and pneumonia followed by 'All respiratory' and Chronic lower respiratory, a pattern seen regionally and nationally.



Graph 1 – Excess winter deaths by underlying cause 2004 - 2011



Historically Wokingham has tracked below national, regional and a comparitor group percentage of excess deaths but since 2010 the percentage as increased as seen in graph 2.



Graph 2 – Percentage of Excess Winter Deaths 1993 - 2010

When comparing admissions for all respiratory conditions from Wokingham CCG between March – August and September – February there is a 17% increase. Within that inpatient admissions increase 16% to 836 from 720 and day cases increase 29% from 63% to 81% with a 6% increase in toal bed days. The cost attached to these excess winter admissions increases by 35% from £68,000 to £92,000.

Healthcare and social care workers who are not vaccinated risk increasing spread amongst those who are at risk and large outbreaks within this population leads to sickness absence at a very busy time.



Between surgeries within Wokingham CCG there is a substantial variation in uptake ranging from 69.4% - 80.7% in those over 65yrs and 40.6% – 65.5% in those under 65yrs in clinical risk groups. Comparing the last two years uptake data Wokingham has seen a fall of 1% uptake in over 65yrs from 75.4% - 74.4%, fall of 0.1% in those under 65 in clinical risk groups from 53.6% - 53.5% and a fall of 5.7% in pregnant women from 50.5% to 44.8%.

Uptake within Primary Care staff in Wokingham is second lowest in the Thames Valley at 59.5% (CCG) with the Thames Valley average at 64.7% with uptake in CCG in Thames Valley ranging from 58.9% – 81%. Berkshire Health Care Trust has increased from 35.5% to 50% between 2012/2013 – 2013/2014. This is data as a whole rather than Wokingham specific staff. There is not data for 2012/2013 for Royal Berkshire Hospital but 2013/2014 uptake was 51.2%.

In clinical risk groups uptake is greatest at around 70% in those with diabetes possibly as they have regular contact with health care but the relative risk of dying from influenza in this group is the lowest of all the clinical risk groups. The three clinical risk groups with the highest relative risk of mortality as a result of influenza are immunosuppression, neurological and chronic liver conditions. Immunosuppressed patients have just under 60% uptake but neurological and chronic liver disease patients have the lowest uptake out of all of the at risk groups as seen in Graph 4..

LOCAL RECOMMENDATIONS

The Wokingham Needs Assessment recommended that the priorities for the 2014/2015 campaign should be:-

- To raise awareness of the flu immunisation programme within general practice with a focus on the over 65s, pregnant women and those in at-risk groups.
- To raise awareness of the flu immunisation programme with older people in the community targeting those living in deprived communities and for those from priority groups for example: those with long term conditions, mental health problems, learning disabilities and Minority Ethnic communities.
- To work with Housing to ensure that support is available to vulnerable people to keep themselves warm in winter.
- Improve access to flu jabs by making offering through other settings like community pharmacies and antenatal clinics.

Review of the 2013/2014 influenza campaign in Berkshire identified the following gaps and recommendations:-

- 1. No targeted campaign for Carers
- 2. Targeted service for children in Special Schools
- 3. Targeted services for other vulnerable community members
- 4. Gaps in Community Pharmacy Flu Service
- 5. Targeted services for pregnant women
- 6. Targeted service for those with Long Term Conditions
- 7. Uncoordinated work across Berkshire

Fluenz Tetra does contain porcine gelatine and there is currently no alternative. Public Health England has gained broad acceptance from faith groups over this ingredients usage, but some groups of the populations might find its inclusion not acceptable. The current briefing regarding porcine gelatine from PHE can be found at www.gov.uk/government/news/vaccines-and-gelatine-phe-response. Current policy dictates only those with clinical contraindications or in at risk groups can receive an inactive version rather than Fluenz Tetra.

Wokingham borough council has a duty to vaccinate all social care staff and the National Flu Plan 2014 / 2015 recommends extension of this provision to frontline staff working in institutions with vulnerable populations, for example special schools.

Those in the 2 – 4 year old target group will be given a nasal spray vaccine.

Data Collection

Vaccine uptake information in 2014/15 will be reported by Public Health England for the following groups:

- people aged 65 and over
- people aged under 65 with specific clinical conditions
- all pregnant women
- all two, three and four year olds
- healthcare workers with direct patient contact
- carers

Nationally the target is to achieve 75% uptake across all of the target groups. The Thames Valley Area Team has sent a local target of 60% coverage. The vaccine update data is based on registered GP Practice population (ImmForm 2014). The data will be released every week by Public Health England on Thursdays and these will coincide with a press briefing when needed.

Public Health teams can access data on uptakes from the Regional Flu Imms Team on roughly a week's time delay and owing to data protection it is not possible to show this by surgery. The Medicines Management Team are exploring if we can extract this data through a prescribing database 'Eclipse' which will be in real time and by surgery.

Part of the Wokingham Flu Action Plan involves flu clinics in community settings and it is very important to capture the data from these vaccinations for recognition within the data return. Those delivering these vaccines will have access to an NHS.net email address so the data can be sent securely to the CCG to be sent on to practice managers.

Wokingham Flu Planning Group

Public Health held a flu planning day as part of the much bigger 'Keeping Warm and Well in Wokingham' agenda. A variety of partners were involved in the consultation process both in person at the event and electronically for those who could not attend. The planning day looked at all of our communication routes with the target population groups, perceived barriers against uptake of vaccine from the target populations and review of some of the new ideas to assist in raising uptake. This planning group will only meet at the start and at the end of the flu season with electronic communication where needed in the flu season. The delivery of the Wokingham flu action plan will be coordinated by Public Health at Wokingham Borough Council. As well as members of the community the planning group included:-

Communication and Delivery Action Plan

Within Wokingham for 2014/2015 Influenza there will be two main focuses to the plan. Firstly communication of the appropriate messages through relevant partners aimed to engage target populations and myth busting. The second is around the delivery of vaccine opportunities in the most appropriate venues to encourage uptake in all target groups.

Evidence suggests personalised and proactive invitations have a key role in uptake of vaccines and thus it is important GP's and other health care professionals working with eligible groups have a timely invitation process through booking systems, patient newsletters and the invitation letter produced by PHE. www.gov.uk/government/publications/flu-vaccination-invitation-template-letter

From local consultation it is apparent the messages need to be engaging to the target community. Over 65yrs told us they would not think they needed the vaccine but if they were told they should have it to protect their grandchildren then they would be more likely to have the vaccine. This works in reverse when engaging the parents of 2 – 4 year olds where often the message of protecting grandparents seemed to be more of a draw. Carers and healthcare workers the messages most appealing was to protect the person they care for rather than to prevent them from getting the flu and not being able to undertake their caring role.

The planning day resulted in a concept of a myth busting germ character team. This will include three characters:-

Spike – who is a virus looking character with muscular arms and legs to show he is strong as he has had the vaccine

Tish – Will carry the message of using a tissue when sneezing

Squeak - Who is squeaky clean as always washes with soap and water

These characters can be applied to other public health campaigns and if there is success within the flu campaign the team might be expanded in the future.

Myth busting messages

Myths appear to be ones of the key reasons patients and health care professionals decline the vaccine. The following myth busting messages will be used in communications and as a tool kit for those encouraging patients to have the vaccines.

1. Having flu is just like having a heavy cold

A bad bout of flu is much worse than a heavy cold. Flu symptoms come on suddenly and sometimes severely. They include fever, chills, headaches and aching muscles, as well as a cough and sore throat. So, you're likely to spend two or three days in bed. If you get complications caused by flu, you could become seriously ill and have to go to hospital.

2. Having the flu jab gives you flu

No, it doesn't. The influenza vaccine contains inactivated flu viruses, so it can't give you flu. There are some fairly common but mild side effects. Your arm may feel a bit sore where you were injected, and some people get a slight temperature and aching muscles for a couple of days afterwards which are all signs that the vaccine is working. Other reactions are very rare.

3. Flu can be treated with antibiotics

No, it can't. Viruses cause flu and antibiotics only work against bacteria. You may be prescribed antiviral medicines to treat your flu. Antivirals do not cure flu but they can make you less infectious to others and can reduce the length of time that you may be ill. To be effective, antivirals have to be given within a day or two of your symptoms appearing. A bacterial infection may occur as a result of having the flu, in which case you may be given antibiotics.

4. Once you've had a flu jab, you're protected for life

No, you aren't. The viruses that cause flu can change every year, so you need a vaccination each year that matches the new viruses. The vaccine usually provides protection for the duration of the flu season that year.

5. Children can't have the flu jab

Children over the age of six months who are most 'at risk' of serious illness if they catch flu are eligible for the flu jab on the NHS and it's important that they receive the vaccine. These are children with a pre-existing illness such as a respiratory or neurological condition or children who are having treatment such as chemotherapy.

6. It is half way through the winter now so no point me having the flu vaccine

Although it is best to have the vaccine when it becomes available you can still access the vaccine until March and the flu can strike anytime in the winter season.

7. I've already had the flu so I do not need the vaccine this year

There are many types of flu viruses and you will only develop immunity naturally to the strain of flu you have had. So you should have the vaccine each year event if you had flu in a previous year or in early winter.
