All schools approached in the Wokingham Borough, including own admission authority schools, have reacted positively to approaches made by the local authority for the prompt placement of children under the Fair Access Protocol for Vulnerable Children.

There has been one request for a managed move from The Forest School to Emmbrook School and two managed moves following parental requests from South Lake Primary to Beechwood Primary School supported by the Vulnerable Children's Education Service.

Children in care:

This group of children are prioritised within the admission arrangements of the council and own authority schools and included within the Fair Access Protocol and fully complies with the Code in the placement of children in care.

All own admission authority schools also comply by prioritising under the oversubscription criteria. For in-year applications, these children are covered under the Fair Access Protocol for Vulnerable Children (three children were placed in this academic year). Liaison on applications for such children is made with the Headteacher responsible for these children to ensure a smooth transition to the new school.

Children with disabilities:

The authority makes provision for children with disabilities through individual Statements of Special Educational Need and has resources to meet specific needs as follows:

Secondary:

Physical disabilities – preferred school – The Piggott CE School Dyslexia – resource at The Bulmershe School

Primary:

Physical disabilities – resource at All Saint's Church of England Primary School and Lambs Lane Primary School

Hearing Impairment – designated schools - Emmbrook Infant & Junior School and Ambleside Nursery School

Speech & Language – resource at Highwood Primary School Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) – resource at Wescott Infant & Westende Junior Schools

The authority has, as its' second oversubscription criterion, 'children who have a serious medical, physical or psychological condition which makes it essential that they attend the preferred school rather than any other. This criterion enables parents to apply where their child has a specific need that can only be met by their preferred schools and they are required to submit written confirmation from the professional persons involved with the family for consideration by an admissions panel.

Schools make provision within their policies and procedures to meet the needs of children with disabilities.

There is a process for schools to bid for capital funds to improve accommodation or to make specific provision where appropriate.

Children with Special Educational Needs:

Reviews were completed by statutory deadlines for the primary to secondary school and infant to junior school transfer. Parental preference is taken into account when considering naming a school on the Statement of Special Educational Need and parents have the opportunity to express preferences through the completion of the common application form.

Secondary schools will admit the following number of children with Statements of Special Educational Needs to start year 7 in September 2011:

The Bulmershe -4 (1 child allocated who is currently under assessment) The Emmbrook -7 (1 child allocated who is currently under assessment) The Forest -1

The Holt – 2 (2 children allocated who are currently under assessment)
Maiden Erlegh – 16 (1 child allocated who is currently under assessment)
The Piggott CE Aided – 6 (1 child who is currently under assessment)
St Crispin's – 4 (2 children who are currently under assessment)
Waingels College – 2 (2 children who are currently under assessment)

Total - 42 (plus 10 currently under assessment). Total in 2010/11 – 47

The children currently under assessment are subject to late referrals, either by school or parent, for assessment for Statements of Special Educational Needs. These children have been allocated school places in accordance with parental preference through the co-ordinated admissions scheme.

Eleven children with Statements of Special Educational Needs were named for maintained schools in the infant to junior school transfer.

Placement of children to start school is more problematical as there are more late requests for assessment from parents; early year's settings or late moves to the area which will result in assessment and issuing of Statements of Special Educational Needs after the main allocation. Whilst recognising that such children would be 'excepted' for a year under the Code; this is of particular concern to schools trying to maintain infant class sizes to 30. Five children in this cohort currently have Statements of Special Educational Needs naming a specific maintained school with eleven assessments outstanding, including allocations to the resource places which currently remain unfilled.

The SEN Team report that three tribunals were lodged this academic year; one as a result of a refusal to assess, one for an independent school and one for an independent special school. These were subsequently withdrawn due to successful negotiations with parents.

Service Children:

Provision has been made in the Fair Access Protocol for service children and children of Crown Servants and where possible places are allocated at preferred schools promptly. The garrison address is used where quarters have not been allocated to ensure that a local address is used for allocation purposes provide an Assignment Order is submitted with the application.

Where possible, the authority will try to comply with parental preference but there are instances at key stage one where infant class size legislation prevents the authority from allocating a place and in such instances a place at the nearest school with places is offered and parents offered right of appeal.

This authority has been co-ordinating admissions for a number of years, including in-year, and schools have been extremely helpful in placing children in a timely manner and responding to prompt placement positively when requested, including schools which are their own admission authority.

b) the admission of pupils in the authority's area to **other admission authority schools** in September 2011.

Co-ordination has been most effective this year ensuring that only one place is held by a parent at any one time. Secondary and in-year co-ordination is particularly effective, as the secondary process is well established with realistic timescales.

There remain some challenges for primary co-ordination, namely:

- i) Whilst there is a common closing date for applications for bulk primary admissions and a common date for potential offers through co-ordination; there is no common date for the first exchange of applications to other authorities; exchange of information to own admission authority schools; ranked lists to be submitted to the local authority or a common offer date. This has resulted in own admission authority schools waiting for applications for ranking from other local authorities before they can hold their governing body meeting to rank their applications.
- ii) The potential result of this delay is that own admission authority schools have had to schedule their governing body meetings as late as possible; submitting ranked lists and first offer and final offers as part of co-ordination taking place up to the deadline of 31 March.
- iii) This led to a very tight timescale in addressing issues relating to the shortage of school places coinciding with the spring holiday prior to the offer day for this authority of 21 April.
- iv) Whilst co-ordination has been effective, due to the changeover in arrangements and systems at primary level, two neighbouring authorities sent letters to parents resident in the Borough in error Windsor & Maidenhead and West Berkshire which resulted in the parents receiving two letters offering places.

There is still some confusion for in-year applications, when a family is moving, as to which authority they apply to as it is a local decision in line with individual admissions policies, whether the current local authority will process the application or, if evidence is provided, the authority in which the new address is situated. It would be more helpful if the country followed the same arrangement.

If the data for 2011 is significantly different from 2010 please state how it differs.

The headcount figures for 2010 and 2011 do not include subsidiary registered pupils i.e. those pupils that are also registered at another school. The percentage of pupils eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) is based on pupil numbers on roll (NOR) and FSM eligibility regardless of enrolment status.

There has been an increase in FSM at local authority level.

Grazeley Parochial Church of England Primary School, Addington and Souhfield schools appear to have the highest significant increases in percentage of FSM.

In the case of Grazeley, which is a small school; the number of pupils eligible for FSM rises from 4 in 2010 to 9 in 2011.

In the case of Addington; the number of pupils eligible for FSM rises from 44 in 2010 to 55 in 2011.

In the case of Southfield; the number of pupils eligible for FSM rises from 22 in 2010 to 32 in 2011.

When comparing 2011 data against 2010 data there is:

- an overall increase in primary schools of pupils claiming FSM of 0.4%
- an overall increase in secondary schools of pupils claiming FSM of 0.6%
- an overall increase in special schools of pupils claiming FSM of 9% giving an overall net increase in the Wokingham Borough of pupils claiming FSM of 0.5%.

Using and interpreting the data, please comment on whether the allocation of school places meets parental preferences for those children on Free School Meals.

The admissions authorities in the Wokingham Borough have not adopted oversubscription criteria that prioritise children receiving Free School Meals as this would be prohibited under the School Admissions Code and are therefore unaware who is in receipt of Free School Meals when allocating places

When analysing the data on secondary school preferences, which includes children living outside the borough attending Wokingham Borough schools, the following can be determined:

Out of 130 pupils eligible for FSM, 99 were allocated their first preferred school, which is equivalent to 76%.

Of the 31 pupils eligible for FSM who were not allocated their first preference, 8 pupils were not allocated a Wokingham Borough school. 8 pupils will have received the offer of another Wokingham Borough school expressed as a lower preference.

15 of these 31 pupils did not select a Wokingham Borough school as their first preference school and may have received their first preferred school outside the borough.

When analysing the data for pupils eligible for Free School Meals attending school and living in the Wokingham Borough, the following can be determined:

Out of 88 pupils eligible for FSM, 76 were allocated to their first preferred school, which is equivalent to 86%.

Of the 12 pupils eligible for FSM who were not allocated their first preferred school; 4 pupils were not subsequently allocated a Wokingham Borough school.

1 of these 12 pupils did not select a first choice school and is currently undergoing an assessment for a Statement of Special Educational Needs.

Targeted Support:

- A key factor in identifying those in need of more support has meant a substantial amount of networking with other professionals and services to help identify those who are deemed to be in need of additional support in applying to schools.
- Links have been made with: Home School Liaison Service, SENCO area meetings, Social Services, Parent Partnerships, Learning Difficulties and Disability teams, Educational Psychologists, Education Welfare, Early Years Team, Children's Centre Family Workers, Primary and Secondary Schools and Traveller Education Service.
- Data and Census information that has been available from Wokingham Borough Council has also enabled us to look at those schools with a high EAL intake and those in receipt of free school meals. – presentations have been offered to those schools and further one to one sessions will also be provided
- Joint home visits alongside other professionals such as Home School Liaison Service and Educational Psychologists have also taken place, which has enabled parents to ensure that they have the correct information in regards to making preferences on their application form.
- e) Describe how Choice Advice has contributed to the fairness of the admissions process.

The School Preference service offers a universal service available to all families within the Wokingham Borough. In addition to this a targeted service is offered to those who would find making an application difficult for reasons such as English as an Additional Language, Literacy issues or lack of confidence or uncertainty as to how the system works.
