The LAA has a (as yet undefined) reward element to it. This, unlike the previous LAA, is based on the performance of all the performance targets in the agreement and not just on a select few and will be dependent on the performance of a number of local partners and not just the Council. Local partners who are involved in the achievement of reward funding will expect to either receive reward funding or be involved in deciding its use. The reward funding generated from the LAA will be available to the Council in two equal installments after the completion of the agreement in April 2011, and will be split 50/50 between revenue and capital funding.

Please note: The Recommendation must request the Supplementary Estimate required in this year, noting the ongoing commitment in future years.

### SUPPORTING INFORMATION

### Introduction

Since 2002, Wokingham has had a 10 year Sustainable Community Strategy which sets out the core ambitions for the Borough which all partners and residents can easily understand and contribute too. These Community Ambitions have been the cornerstone to all the key strategies and work programmes that have impacted upon the lives of residents in recent years.

### They are:

- Balancing Economic Prosperity with a Sustainable Quality of Life
- Being a Community Where Everyone Feels Safe, Welcome and Respected
- Supporting and Caring For People Who Need Help
- · Being a Healthy and Well-Educated Community

As we progress through the lifespan of the Sustainable Community Strategy, the actions taken to support these ambitions change as we make progress towards achieving them. This is evidenced by the detailed contents of the Community Strategy Action Plan, the Council's Local Public Service Agreement, the Borough's first Local Area Agreement and the work programmes of the key partnerships operating within the Borough. This progression is now continuing in to the Borough's new Local Area Agreement which will run from 2008 until 2011.

### The New Local Area Agreement

The Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act (2007) include the requirement for all local authority areas to develop a new Local Area Agreement by 31<sup>st</sup> May 2008.

This new Local Area Agreement differs slightly, but significantly, from the Borough's existing LAA which began in April 2006. There no longer remains a requirement to structure the priorities and targets within four prescribed 'blocks' which provides additional freedom in how the LAA is structured, but the choice of performance targets has been greatly reduced by the requirement to only select up to 35 performance targets from a basket of 198 specified indicators (know as the National Indicator Set).

For the first time, statutory agency partners are now formally required to contribute to the achievement of the priorities by the regulations of the Act. There remains a Reward Element to the LAA, but this has yet to be fully defined, and it is expected that it will be significantly less than the £3.7m that was available for the previous LAA.

### The Priorities for the new Local Area Agreement

The seventeen priorities within the new Local Area Agreement have been identified following a comprehensive consultation and debate between the partners in the Wokingham Borough Strategic Partnership. The seventeen priorities are shown below and collated into each of the existing Community Ambitions for the Borough (from the Community Strategy) that they support:

### **Selecting Performance Indicators**

Each Local Area Agreement must identify and agree with Government a suite of up to 35 performance indicators in order to measure progress against each of the priorities identified above. These performance indicators can only be selected from a new list of 198 indicators contained in what the government has called the National Indicator Set. The NIS replaces the old performance indicators that the Council used to collect and report such as the BVPI's, PAF and PLS indicators.

The current proposed suite of performance indicators and targets are contained within the draft LAA which has been circulated separately.

### Timescale

The new LAA needs to be submitted to Government by 31<sup>st</sup> May 2008 and will run until 31<sup>st</sup> March 2011.
