PURPOSE OF REPORT (Inc Strategic Outcomes)

The National Bus Strategy advised every Local Transport Authority in England, outside of London, to create an Enhanced Partnership (EP) Agreement with local bus operators as a basis for improving bus services. An EP is a legal agreement which has several statutory processes to go through, including a statutory consultation, before it can be legally made.

The purpose of this report is to gain approval for Wokingham Borough Council's response to Reading Borough Council's Enhanced Partnership Agreement for local bus services.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Executive Member for Highways and Transport approve the Council's response to Reading Borough Council's Enhanced Partnership Agreement for local bus services, as set out in Annex A to the report.

SUMMARY OF REPORT

Wokingham Borough Council (WBC) is a statutory consultee for Reading Borough Council (RBC) in the process of making an Enhanced Partnership.

RBC published their Enhanced Partnership Agreement for Statutory Consultation on 18th February 2022. The response attached as Annex A will be submitted on behalf of Wokingham Borough Council.

Background

WBC is supportive of the shared objectives of building a sustainable, efficient, and growing bus network that meets the needs of residents across both boroughs and welcomes the opportunity to work with RBC.

The key objectives of RBC's EP Plan align with the National Bus Strategy and additionally include the need to enhance bus access and facilities within Reading town center. RBC's Enhanced Partnership Scheme covers the whole of Reading Borough by targeting investment onto eight key corridors. Three of the eight key corridors facilitate local bus services originating in Wokingham Borough, these are:

- Southern Corridor connects Reading town centre with housing south of Reading in Wokingham Borough
- South-eastern Corridor connects Reading town centre with Royal Berkshire Hospital, University of Reading, Lower Earley and Thames Valley Science Park.
- Eastern Corridor is the main access from areas east of Reading, into Reading town centre via the A3290

Twenty separate proposals containing a series of measures, facilities, and provisions for delivering improvements on the key corridors. WBC is identified as a key delivery partner for nine of the twenty proposals, in summary these are:

- Reviewing Service Frequency
- Increasing Bus Priority Measures
- Consideration for Bus Rapid Transit
- Integrating Services with other modes
- Simplifying Services
- Reviewing socially necessary services
- Investing in a Superbus network
- Bus Passenger Charter
- Strengthening Network Identity

WBC is supportive of joint working in circumstances where proposals align with both local authorities' Enhanced Partnership Plans, provide a benefit to both boroughs and where sufficient funding is available to ensure effective delivery.

RBC's EP Scheme requires local bus services, which are not otherwise exempt, to meet certain quality standards to make use of bus priority infrastructure and local bus stops within Reading Borough. The EP Scheme does not provide sufficient detail at this stage on what these standards might be. Whilst WBC fully supports the need for a certain standard of quality in local bus service provision, WBC is also mindful that any standards imposed must not prevent competition or be prohibitive to new routes and operators emerging in the local bus markets within either Borough.

The delivery mechanism and governance for RBC's EP Agreement is contained in the EP Plan. WBC welcomes the opportunity to be part of RBC's, Enhanced Partnership Forum and undertake an observer role on the Enhanced Partnership Board.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS OF THE RECOMMENDATION

The Council faces severe funding pressures, particularly in the face of the COVID-19 crisis. It is therefore imperative that Council resources are focused on the vulnerable and on its highest priorities.

RE: Consultation Response to Reading Borough Council's Enhanced Partnership Plan and Scheme

Thank you for providing Wokingham Borough Council with the opportunity to comment on Reading Borough Council's (RBC) Enhanced Partnership (EP) Agreement.

Wokingham Borough Council (WBC) is keen to work in partnership with RBC to ensure a coordinated approach to the delivery of local bus services across our respective boroughs. Following the significant impact of the coronavirus pandemic and the lack of clarity around future government funding, we particularly keen to support the shared objective of building a sustainable, efficient, and growing bus network that meets the needs of residents in both of our boroughs.

WBC welcomes the opportunity to be part of RBC's Enhanced Partnership Forum and undertake an observer role on the Enhanced Partnership Board. It is noted that several actions within RBC's Enhanced Partnership Plan's Delivery Action Plan require joint working between our two boroughs. WBC is supportive of joint working in circumstances where proposals align with both local authorities' Enhanced Partnership Plans, provide a benefit to both boroughs and where sufficient funding is available to deliver them.

It is understood that local bus services will not be permitted to use local bus infrastructure, including bus priority lanes and local bus stops in RBC unless the service meets the EP Scheme's quality standards or is otherwise exempt. At the current time, RBC's EP is unclear on what the expected service quality standards are that will need to be met. Whilst WBC fully supports the need for a certain standard of quality in local bus service provision, WBC is also mindful that any standards imposed must not prevent competition or be prohibitive to new routes and operators emerging in the local bus market either within RBC or any neighbouring authority.

I trust the above comments are helpful to RBC in the further development of your EP Agreement. WBC would be happy to engage further with RBC before the EP is finalised through the statutory legal process.
