OUTCOME / BENEFITS TO THE COMMUNITY

There is an existing requirement for licence holders to undertake a session of disability awareness training. It is proposed to introduce a regular refresher training session to ensure that licence holders are appraised of any changes in legislation and advice, as well as to ensure licence holders are reminded of their role in providing accessible transport to disabled people.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Committee agrees to the Licensing Department carrying out a consultation with the trade in relation to disability awareness refresher training for licence holders.

SUMMARY OF REPORT

The report proposes the introduction of regular refresher training for licence holders, in addition to initial training at the time the licence is first issued.

Background

There is an existing requirement that new applicants for licences must attend a suitable training session so they are aware of their legal duties as well as best practice for providing assistance to disabled passengers.

It is felt that regular refresher sessions of this training should be mandatory for licence holders. It is important that the trade are aware of changes in applicable legislation, for example, in 2017 sections of the Equality Act 2010 came into force making it an offence for the driver of a designated vehicle to refuse to carry a passenger because they use a wheelchair, and best practice advice is also subject to change. Regular refresher training will ensure that licence holders are appraised of such changes so they are best able to provide an efficient service to the residents of Wokingham Borough, as well as visitors.

Analysis of Issues

Disability awareness training as a requirement for licence holders is recommended in the Government's Inclusive Transport Strategy: Achieving Equal Access for Disabled People (July 2018), the Local Government Association's Taxi and PHV licensing Councillors' handbook (August 2017), and the recent Task and Finishing Group report (September 2018).

It is proposed that it would be a requirement for licence holders to undergo this training upon initial application, and thereafter on a three yearly basis. Any existing licence holder who was licensed prior to the training being mandatory, or who attended the training more than three years ago, will be given a set period to attend a session. This is suggested to be 12 months.

The cost for this training shall be borne by the licence holder.

It is proposed that prior to the implementation of the requirement, a consultation will be carried out with the general public and the taxi trade. The results of the consultation would be brought back to this Committee with appropriate recommendations.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS OF THE RECOMMENDATION

The Council faces severe financial challenges over the coming years as a result of the austerity measures implemented by the Government and subsequent reductions to public sector funding. It is estimated that Wokingham Borough Council will be required to make budget reductions in excess of £20m over the next three years and all Executive decisions should be made in this context.
